

TOP PROJECTS



BRAIN DAMAGE20x24 OCTOBER 2025

This piece captures the duality of the artist — the genius and the torment, the voice that refuses to be silenced. This piece draws inspiration from Eminem's alter ego, Slim Shady, and the chaos that fueled his rise. The bold yellow hair, the stark black background, and the hauntingly expressive blue eye create a tension between power and pain. The taped mouth marked "MY NAME IS" symbolizes identity under pressure — a commentary on fame, mental strain, and the fight to be heard beyond the noise. For me, this painting represents the struggle to own my story — the moments when creativity is both the wound and the cure. It's about battling inner voices, confronting the past, and transforming pain into purpose. The drips and sharp lines mirror that emotional distortion — beautiful, messy, and brutally honest. This piece isn't just a portrait of an artist — it's a reflection of every person who's ever felt misunderstood, yet chose to speak through art anyway.



VANDAL'S SMILE

18x20 OCTOBER 2025

A modern rebellion painted in disguise — takes the world's most mysterious face and drags her through rebellion and rebirth; a graffiti-style twist on a timeless illusion. Her smile, shifting from serious to smirk, reflects the duality within all of us exploring what happens when composure meets chaos, and beauty becomes defiance.

The palette itself tells a story: Painted in bold contrasts, neon yellow glows like electricity against matte black, symbolizing light breaking through shadow — awakening from struggle into creation. Hot pink, dripping from her heart and carved into devilish horns, becomes the pulse of emotion — love, rebellion, and unapologetic self-expression. Each color collides rather than blends, mirroring the tension between control and freedom, destruction and art.

The original Mona Lisa disappeared for two years before returning as a legend. That loss and rebirth became her power — just as I found mine through art. MARILYN IN THE MIRROR

Her hand pressed softly to her face adds a quiet, introspective mood — like she's caught mid-thought in a rare moment of solitude, peering back at herself beyond the spotlight. The fragmented grayscale technique gives the image a mirrored, almost ghostly quality. It feels like you're witnessing both Marilyn the myth and Norma Jeane the woman — layered, complex, and suspended in reflection. This piece is a love letter to the humanity behind the glamor. Marilyn in the Mirror is a reminder that even the most adored figures in history wrestle with identity, loneliness, and vulnerability. TRIPPIN



The gold suggests value, but also excess, ego, and temptation. It raises a question: what have we sacrificed to get where we are, and was it worth it? This piece transforms a symbol of fearlessness into a visual confession. Guilt Drip reminds me that even the boldest among us wrestle with emotion, memory, and morality. It's a confrontation between pride and pain, and the realization that power doesn't always mean peace. This piece holds space for both the predator and the person inside me — the part that roars, and the part that bleeds.

The characters are stylized with oversized, almost ghost-like eyes and a visible red string tying them together—a nod to the "red thread of fate" concept, symbolizing an inseparable connection, whether beautiful or binding. The white drips from their eyes hint at innocence lost, vulnerability, and the emotional weight of love when it gets messy, possessive, or performative. "Mouse Trap" represents the duality of love—how it can be sweet and nostalgic, yet also sticky, intense, and even suffocating. LAST SHOT

The deep purple border nods to the Lakers legacy, while gold streaks and splatters echo both glory and grief. The golden drips forming a halo over Kobe's head are intentional, symbolizing both divinity and the weight of legacy—eternal and untouchable. Captured from behind, Kobe is mid-motion—focused, poised, and present in the moment. It's not a celebration, nor a farewell—it's the quiet second right before history is made. That moment says everything about his mentality: focused, relentless, unshaken. "Final Shot" is more than a painting—it's a pause in time, a moment of stillness that contains decades of discipline, pain, greatness, and sacrifice. This piece represents the mindset of pushing through—the Mamba Mentality—not just in sports, but in life. Creating this painting was emotional. I didn't want to glorify the tragedy—I wanted to honor the spirit. The gold halo is my way of saying he's bigger than basketball now. He's legacy. He's inspiration. He's eternal motion.


MADAME 18x24 APRIL 2025

The woman's confident posture, paired with the stark simplicity of the composition, speaks volumes without revealing a single facial feature. To me, "Madame" represents sensual strength and self-possession. The red symbolizes passion, danger, and unapologetic boldness, while the black silhouette leaves space for interpretation — allowing her to become anyone, or everyone. She is the muse, the force, the one who doesn't need to speak to be heard. This piece is important to me because it celebrates feminine mystery, curves, and courage — standing tall in her own doorway, commanding her space and story.



THE MELTDOWN 18x24 APRIL 2025

"The Meltdown" is a vibrant yet unsettling exploration of emotional contrast and psychological overload. Using bright yellows and bold blues to symbolize happiness and calm, the work is intentionally disrupted by dripping black paint, chaotic smiles, and crossed-out eyes—visual metaphors for emotional distortion, burnout, and the fragility of mental stability. The smiling faces are not all what they seem—some are melting, others crossed out, some even crying black tears—challenging the viewer to look beyond surface-level emotion and consider what lies beneath curated appearances. The drips and smears amplify the idea of a breakdown—literal and emotional. Through this piece I was able to confront the disconnect between how I was perceived and how I truly felt. Every face, every drip, every distorted smile captures that tension between joy and exhaustion."The Meltdown" is a reminder to acknowledge our emotions, honor our limits, and accept that it's okay to not be okay. It's a visual diary entry—raw, loud, and honest—and one of the most meaningful pieces I've ever created.



JOKES ON YOU 16x20 APRIL 2025

"Jokes on You" is an emotional portrait of the Joker — not as a comic book villain, but as a raw symbol of pain, chaos, and defiance. With vivid yellows, deep reds, and streaks of smudged face paint dripping like blood, this piece captures the blurred line between comedy and tragedy. The cigarette smoke curling like a sinister whisper and the maniacal laughter scribbled beside him drive home the tension between what's seen on the surface and the storm brewing underneath. This painting is important to me because it speaks to the fractured human experience — where laughter can mask suffering and performance becomes survival. Jokes on You is about embracing the darkness we're told to suppress, and turning it into something unapologetically honest. It's my artistic response to a world that often misunderstands pain when it's dressed in a smile.



UNKILLABLE

"Unkillable" is a bold, stylized portrait of Jason Voorhees — the iconic, relentless figure from the Friday the 13th franchise. Painted in high contrast with dramatic lines and ominous tones, this piece captures more than just a horror icon; it reflects an unstoppable force. The blood, the mask, the rain, and the silence all speak to something deeper than fear — they echo resilience, revenge, and raw survival. To me, "Unkillable" symbolizes the darker side of endurance — the ability to keep coming back, no matter how many times you're knocked down, buried, or forgotten. Jason represents what society fears but can't destroy: the shadow we ignore until it rises again. This painting is important because it channels that inner monster we all sometimes need — the version of ourselves that doesn't quit, doesn't speak, but keeps moving forward. "Kill the Messenger" is a bold acrylic painting that reimagines the iconic Ghostface figure from Scream, giving it a raw, emotional twist. With heart-shaped eye sockets bleeding red and a look of exaggerated anguish, the familiar mask becomes more than just a symbol of horror—it becomes a metaphor for emotional vulnerability and societal deflection. The bleeding heart eyes and the expressive hand gesture evoke heartbreak and silent screams—feelings that are often dismissed or villainized when exposed. The use of bold primary colors—electric blue, blood red, and stark white—adds to the tension and contrast, symbolizing emotional extremes and unresolved conflict. This piece is important to me because it transforms fear into empathy. It's about the pain of being misunderstood, the weight of carrying hard truths, and the consequence of vulnerability in a world that often prefers masks over authenticity. Through this piece, I wanted to explore the duality of the villain and the victim—and how sometimes, they are one and the same.



POISONOUS

This acrylic piece, "Poisonous", blends playful sweetness with bold defiance. The rich red cherries, traditionally symbols of temptation and desire, pop against a clean white backdrop, framing the sharply rendered gothic script that declares: Bite Me. The juxtaposition of innocent fruit with a rebellious phrase creates tension between appearance and attitude—an intentional contrast that speaks to deeper layers of identity and perception. To me, this painting is about reclaiming power in the face of being underestimated. The cherries lure you in, but the message bites back. It challenges the viewer to consider how charm, softness, or femininity are often mistaken for weakness—when in fact, they can carry venomous strength. This piece is important because it reminds us that boundaries can be beautiful, sass can be strength, and sweetness doesn't mean submission. It's a cheeky visual punch—a statement about self-respect disguised in candy coating.

"No Name" is a raw, unapologetic piece born from imperfection—and that's exactly what makes it powerful. Painted on the reverse side of a canvas, the bold handwritten message reads: "I fucked up the front, so this is the painting now!"—punctuated by a single kiss mark and underscored with gritty honesty. This work holds deep personal meaning because it embraces the beauty of failure, frustration, and creative rebellion. It turns a mistake into a statement, a discarded idea into a final product. The piece challenges the idea that art must be polished or intentional to be valid—it says that sometimes, what's real and messy carries the most truth. This piece is important to me because it captures a moment of surrender and self-acceptance.
